U.S. employees prepare for a tech-focused world by building human skills like problem solving and decision making

Pearson's Skills Outlook series provides vital insight into the immediate needs of the modern workforce, to help employers and employees stay current on upskilling trends and adapt to a tech-focused world. While the first <u>Skills Outlook</u> report examined the most in-demand skills from an employer's perspective, this second study, Employee View, looks at skilling through an employee's lens. Developed in partnership with Google, we polled 4,000 people in four countries (U.S., U.K., India and Brazil) to see what skills they were prioritizing for their career development.







People globally are consistently citing the desire for fulfilling work and increasing their compensation as the top drivers for advancing in their careers. And they're willing to put time and effort into upskilling to achieve this.

Education and Training Are Seen as Vital Sources for Career Advancement:

- About **4-in-5 (81%)** U.S. workers believe people need to keep relearning and training throughout their careers to stay up to date
- This makes sense, as **76%** of U.S. workers agree the world is shifting to a model where people participate in learning and education over their lifetime
- And it seems employers agree. Nearly half (45%) of U.S. employed workers report that their employers offer skilling as a benefit, and of those workers offered the benefit, nearly 4-in-5 (79%) take advantage

The study also found that the majority of workers (73% of Americans) also say they prefer to learn via their employer.
